# Mission

To modernize legislation and regulations to be consistent with current clinical practices of Nurse Anesthetists and to specifically remove the requirement of the Collaborative Agreement for Nurse Anesthetists.

# Strategy

To seek the introduction of legislation that would modernize the statute to reflect what is currently occurring clinically in Maryland and to remove the requirement to file the "Nurse Anesthetist Notification of Collaboration."

# Background

The Maryland Board of Nursing requires CRNAs to submit a document referred to as a "Nurse Anesthetist Notification of Collaboration". It requires the Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist to provide the name and license number of a "Collaborating Anesthesiologist, Physician or Dentist" that the CRNA is expected to work with. The MBON will only accept one of these documents per provider. In practice, a CRNA coordinates with many providers in many institutions and this document does not guarantee a relationship between the identified collaborator and the CRNA. The current regulations do not accurately reflect what is occurring in many clinical settings.

## **Previous Efforts**

In 2016, the Maryland Association of Nurse Anesthetists supported and lobbied for the Maryland Board of Nursing proposed regulations that would have modernized the regulations and removed the requirement for filing the "Nurse Anesthetist Notification of Collaboration". Many states have been successful using this strategy. The proposed regulations cleared review by the Maryland General Assembly, then the AELR committee, and only needed the Maryland Secretary of the Department of Mental Health and Hygiene (DHMH) to sign it. Unfortunately, the Secretary declined to sign for the final adoption of the regulations and therefore the proposed regulations expired. All other MD APRN disciplines (NP, CNM and CNS) have been successful in removing the collaboration requirement via statutes or regulations. We now seek parity with the other APRNs. Further regulatory efforts look unfavorable with an Interim Secretary of DHMH in place so legislative relief is the logical next step.



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# Plan - Legislative Action

## Education of MANA members
